STI tests now a bigger milestone than meeting the parents



Frank discussions about the importance of being tested for sexually transmitted infections (STIs) such as chlamydia are an important indicator of a lasting relationship, according to a survey released in March. A Populous poll of over 1,000 young adults found that nearly three quarters (70 per cent) rank discussing STI tests together as the most important sign that a new relationship will last. This has overtaken more traditional milestones such as meeting the parents (66 per cent) or friends (40 per cent). The research was conducted on behalf of the *Chlamydia. STI Confidential - STI testing kept in confidence, but some might want to use an alias - by Andrew Paul

Like most things revolving around sexually transmitted infections (STIs) it came out of nowhere. "The information they collect during STD tests isn't kept confidential," a man insisting on remaining anonymous tells me over the phone. "Have you seen the information they collect? Anyone can tell whether you're gay, what drugs you've done, even whether you're a top or bottom. I can't believe this."

Actually yes, I have seen the information they collect during the exam process; I've given up that information. I have made the nerve-wracking first phone call to book an appointment. I have sat waiting for the two weeks leading up to my date with the nurses at the Edmonton STI Clinic. I have completed the personal history inquisition that probed the deepest, darkest depths of my sexual experiences. I've pissed in a cup, and sat splayed open like a Thanksgiving turkey as the nurse delivered the sweet cotton caress of that dastardly swab. Furthermore I've waited that god-awful week after the exam for my results — which came back negative, by the way. That's the testing process in a nutshell, and **it was one of the smartest decisions** of my life. New Study Questions Benefits of Elective Removal of Ovaries During Hysterectomy – Removal of the ovaries (bilateral oophorectomy) while performing a hysterectomy is common practice to prevent the subsequent development of ovarian cancer. This prophylactic procedure is performed in 55% of all U.S. women having a hysterectomy, or approximately 300,000 times each year. An article in the March/April issue of *The Journal of Minimally Invasive Gynecology* suggests that this procedure may do more harm than good. <http://www.sciencedaily.com/releases/2010/03/100309171427.htm>



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HPV-smear screening will not identify cancer risk

Plans to add a test for the human papillomavirus (HPV) to cervical smears would not help doctors identify women at risk of cancer, experts have claimed. The project, which sees women with "borderline" or mild abnormality sample results - suggesting cervical cells could develop into cancer in the future - also tested for HPV, is being trialled at six laboratories across the UK. But a study by the Medical Research Council found that 70% of women testing positive for HPV after a smear did not develop cancer during a three-year follow-up, casting doubt upon the claim that the extra examination helps reduce cancer risk and helps decide on the best course of treatment. <http://www.nursingtimes.net/5012761.article>

Smoking Not Only Cause of Oral Cancer; Doctors Studying Link between Diseases of the Mouth and HPV – Article Abstract

Risk factors for cancers of the mouth and throat now include the STD human papillomavirus (HPV) in addition to tobacco use and alcohol consumption. "Classically, people think of oral cancer as something that occurs in smokers and drinkers and usually among people in their 50s, 60s or even older. But over the last 10 years or so, we have become aware that [HPV] - the same virus that is associated with cervical cancer - has now been strongly associated with certain kinds of head and neck cancer, specifically the tonsil and tongue-based cancers, and that they are becoming more prevalent in people who are younger than the usual cohort," explained Dr. Joseph Dort, a professor of head and neck surgery at the University of Calgary's medical school and president of the Canadian Society of Otolaryngology. <http://www.cdcnpin.org/scripts/display/NewsDisplay.asp?NewsNbr=55118>

Prostate cancer increases blood clot risk - New research by researchers from Kings College London has shown a man's chances of suffering blood clots in his legs or lungs can more than double if he has prostate cancer. Blood clots are already a known hazard linked to cancer, but an international team of scientists has found the specific link between clotting and prostate cancer. Writing in the medical journal *The Lancet Oncology*, the team said the greatest risk is when men are undergoing hormone therapy for the disease. The findings were based on tests on more than 76,000 Swedish men who had received curative treatment for the disease, or who were receiving hormone therapy. http://www.timesonline.co.uk/tol/life_and_style/health/article7096725.ece

Contraception may be provided by maternity departments - The Department of Health may look at ensuring that contraception advice has to be provided at maternity departments, as it now must be by abortion providers. From April last year the standard NHS contract for abortion services stipulated that providers must offer the full range of contraception services to women undergoing abortion. 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Sexualising nurses could lead to attacks on staff, warns Unison - Portraying nurses in a sexually provocative way could contribute to attacks on nursing staff, Unison head of nursing Gail Adams has warned. A row erupted over a Worcestershire bus company advert featuring a "sexy" nurse wearing a PVC uniform. Ms Adams said: "People are happy to sexualise the image of nursing but are then surprised when nurses are attacked or have lewd or indecent comments made towards them. The profession is not boring or 'stuck in the mud' but portraying nurses in this way is unacceptable." <http://www.nursingtimes.net/5012817.article>

Schools take pupils on trips to sexual health clinics - School pupils are being taken on tours of sexual health clinics in an attempt to highlight the perils of unprotected sex. A school trip used to mean a day out at a local museum or nature reserve. But now, classes are making visits to NHS sexually transmitted disease (STD) clinics. The tours are an attempt to "demystify" the consequences of unprotected sex, preparing many children for visits in later life. After each visit, students are sharing their findings with other pupils in school assemblies. Critics fear that the tours are "normalising promiscuity," creating a self-fulfilling prophecy which will further fuel the rise in sexually transmitted diseases. The number of STDs diagnosed in children under 16 has risen by 58 per cent in five years, with chlamydia now the most common infection. <http://www.telegraph.co.uk/news/uknews/7530090/Schools-take-pupils-on-trips-to-sexual-health-clinics.html>

Gonorrhoea may become antibiotic-resistant, experts warn - If new methods of treating gonorrhoea are not found quickly there is a danger the sexually transmitted infection could become antibiotic-resistant according to experts. The World Health Organisation (WHO) is to discuss the common sexually transmitted disease that can lead to pelvic inflammatory disease, infertility and ectopic pregnancy if left untreated, at a meeting in the Philippines. It will focus specifically on efforts to stop the infection resisting drugs. <http://www.nursingtimes.net/5013139.article>

Cancer awareness: the impact of sexual orientation - This report provides the results from a survey of 1600 heterosexual, gay, lesbian and bisexual respondents, using the CR-UK Cancer Awareness Measure (CAM). It was commissioned by DH from YouGov. The results highlight the differences in cancer awareness between different sexual orientation groups. It appears that there is some relationship between sexual orientation and cancer awareness; however it is likely to be much less important than various other factors such as age and gender. This report will be of interest to people involved in early diagnosis of cancer, researching, commissioning or delivering interventions. Men 'more likely' to have chlamydia - Men's attitudes to unprotected sex and STI screening are putting their sexual health at risk, a leading pharmacy group has claimed. According to figures released by Lloydspharmacy, 13% of the men who purchased a chlamydia test from its online service tested positive for the infection compared with 6% of women. It also exposed a widespread reluctance to be screened for STIs, with only 28% of men undergoing a sexual health test at a local GUM (genitourinary medicine) clinic compared with 38% of women. The figures also suggested a somewhat relaxed attitude towards safe sex with 13% of men admitting engaging in unprotected sex with more than one partner in the past five years. By comparison, only 7% of women had admitted having unprotected sex with multiple partners. <http://www.nursingtimes.net/5013305.article>

How A Novel Class Of Antibodies Inhibits HIV Infection - Scientists at Duke University Medical Center have identified a set of naturally occurring antibodies that can block one of the key ways the AIDS virus gains entry into certain blood cells. They say the discovery, published online in the *Journal of Experimental Medicine*, expands traditional notions about how the immune system fights HIV and offers a potential new strategy for HIV vaccine design. <http://www.medicalnewstoday.com/articles/184549.php>

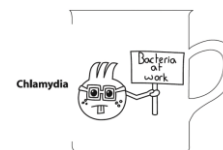

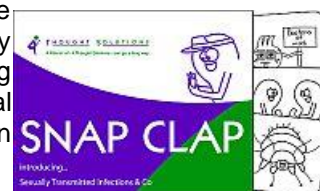
